Objectives

- To instill a sense of responsibility and commitment to social justice.
- To foster critical, independent thinking and problem-solving.
- To encourage collaborative leadership and decision-making.
- To shape a generation of socially conscious global leaders.

Vision

To establish MCC as a nation-wide platform as a means to promote citizenship, social justice and build inclusive and sustainable cities. We plan to generate open resources that can support the replication MCC acrossthe country.

Market Overview

- MCC can range from 100 to 3,000 participants. At this stage we hope MCCs are kept to under 500 participants from from the organizing institute and other local universities and high schools in the city.
- Other MUNs have seen significant participation, with events like the KIIT International MUN attracting 2,500 attendees and Harvard MUN India engaging over 1,400 students, indicating a strong interest in simulation-based learning.
- Previous MCC participants express a desire for more impactful engagement. MCC addresses this by focusing on actionable outcomes and community involvement, ensuring that student ideas can lead to tangible changes.

Why organise an MCC?

- Showcases the institution's dedication to social responsibility and active civic engagement.
- Position Educational Institutions (EIs) as pillars of social good.
- Provide students with mentorship from experts, policymakers, and social entrepreneurs.
- Forge partnerships with local governments, businesses, and NGOs for impactful change.
- Offer experiential learning focused on social change and real-world problem-solving.

- Compilation of ideas for volunteering drives
- Selected (1-3) volunteering drives that will be scaled over the year
- Live model of a sustainable city and/or educational materials



The past MCC have led to the following long-term volunteering drives:

- 1. Lake cleaning The participants are planning on scaling up a low cost floating island to clean up over 20 lakes in Ahmedabad.
- 2. Waste segregation Participants are mobilising people to segregate their waste for proper disposal and are exploring various localized composting options.
- 3. Educational SDG flashcard Participants are developing flashcards targetted at middle school students to help promote an understanding of issues of social justice and engage them in action. Some of the initial flashcard sets will include sets on individual responsibility, climate change, responsible consumptions etc.
